#### **OVERVIEW**

There are currently five remaining primary days across eight states. This memo outlines the candidates, key issues, and projected winners for each party within key U.S. House and Senate races. The primaries remaining are:

• August 13: Hawaii

August 16: Alaska, Wyoming

• August 23: Florida

• September 6: Massachusetts

• September 13: Delaware, New Hampshire, Rhode Island

In general, the key issues resonating among most voters across party lines appear to be *inflation*, gas prices, and the state of the economy. Other prominent issues, polarized by specific party line, include stances on abortion, gun laws, and opinions on the 2020 election (this has been a prominent topic of controversy in Republican primaries). Voters also appear to be concerned with issues including *immigration*, education, and election procedures.

Republicans are widely expected to gain control of the House in the general election this November, and quite possibly the Senate. Stakes for both parties are high, as outcomes in November will determine the scope and success of President Biden's agenda over the next two years.

In addition to Congressional control, the outcomes of the remaining primary races may be a telling indicator of the 2024 Presidential Election. As political figureheads - such as former President Donald J. Trump - test the power of their endorsements of party candidates, the success of endorsed candidates may indicate the likelihood of announcements to run in 2024.

## **AUGUST 2 PRIMARY OUTCOMES**

In Arizona, Trump-backed **Blake Masters (R)** won the nomination and will proceed to face incumbent **Mark Kelly (D).** In the highly-contested Republican gubernatorial primary, Trump-endorsed **Kari Lake (R)** narrowly defeated **Karrin Taylor Robson (R)**. This sets the stage for what will be a highly competitive and expensive election cycle in Arizona for both Governor and Senate seats.

In Michigan, **Tudor Dixon (R)** defeated opponent **Kevin Rinke (R)** in a landslide. In the House, **John Gibbs (R)** defeated incumbent **Peter Meijer (R)** for Michigan's 3rd Congressional District.

In Washington, long-time Democratic Senator Patty Murray (D) and newcomer challenger Tiffany Smiley (R) were selected in the top-two bipartisan primary to advance to the November ballot. In the House, incumbent and pro-Trump impeachment Jamie Herrera Butler (R) lost her primary race to Trump-endorsed primary challenger Joe Kent (R) for recently redistricted WA-03. Kent and Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D) will head to the general election in November. Eyes are also on recently redistricted WA-04, where incumbent Dan Newhouse (R) defeated former gubernatorial candidate Loren Culp (R) to battle to keep the seat from Doug White (D) this November.

In Kansas for the U.S. Senate seat, incumbent **Jerry Moran (R)** won the Republican primary to face the winner of the Democratic primary, **Mark R. Holland (D)**.

In Missouri, U.S. Senator **Roy Blunt (R)** is not seeking reelection. Primary winners **Eric Schmitt (R)** and **Trudy Busch Valentine (D)** will compete for the open seat in November.

### **AUGUST 4 PRIMARY OUTCOMES**

In Tennessee, Jason Martin (D) advances from the Democratic gubernatorial primary to face incumbent Bill Lee (R). Lee is expected to be reelected in November. In the House, Andy Ogles (R), won a crowded Republican primary for the reconfigured, historically left-leaning, congressional district TN-05 in Nashville, a target for Republicans to flip in November. Ogles will face state senator Heidi Campbell (D) in November. In the new 6th District, which also includes parts of Nashville, Rep. John Rose (R) brings a large fundraising advantage over Randal Cooper (D), winner of the Democratic primary. In the new 7th District, Rep. Mark Green (R) won unopposed and will face Odessa Kelly (D) in November.

### **AUGUST 9 PRIMARY OUTCOMES**

In Connecticut, incumbent Senator Richard Blumenthal (D) will face the winner of the Republican primary, Leora Levy (R). In the race for Governor, incumbent Ned Lamont (D) will face Republican challenger Bob Stefanowski (R). Both candidates won unopposed. In the House for District 4, Jayme Stevenson (R) won the Republican primary and will challenge incumbent Jim Himes (D) for the historically Democratic district.

In Minnesota's gubernatorial race, incumbent **Tim Walz (D)** won the Democratic primary with little challenge, and will compete against Republican challenger **Scott Jensen (R)**. In the House, progressive Rep. **Ilhan Omar (D)**, narrowly won her primary against four challengers in Minnesota's 5th Congressional District, with a margin of just a couple thousand votes against second, **Don Samuels (D)**.

In Vermont, an interesting race unfolded for the state's sole At-Large Congressional District, as Rep. **Peter Welch's (D)** seat is up for the taking as he won the Democratic primary for Senate, vacated by Sen. **Patrick Leahy's (D)** retirement. To fill Welch's place in the House, **Becca Balint (D)** emerged the winner of the Democratic primary by a large margin. If elected, she will become the state's first female member of Congress. **Liam Madden (R)** won the Republican nomination.

In Wisconsin, a high-profile Republican primary governor's race came to a close as Trump-backed **Tim Michels (R)** defeated Scott Walker-backed, and former Lt. Governor **Rebecca Kleefisch (R)**. Michels will go on to face incumbent governor **Tony Evers (D)**. In the Senate, incumbent Republican and Trump ally Sen. **Ron Johnson (R)** will face the winner of the Democratic primary, Lt. Gov. **Mandela Barnes (D)**.

### Hawaii

#### **UPCOMING RACES TO WATCH: AUGUST 16 PRIMARIES**

#### Alaska

Former Governor of Alaska and first Republican female vice presidential nominee, **Sarah Palin (R)**, is running for Alaska's at-large congressional seat. The seat, Alaska's only member in the U.S. House of Representatives, was vacated after the death of **Rep. Don Young (R)** in March 2022. Young was the longest-serving Republican in congressional history, having been the U.S. representative for 49 years.

Nineteen candidates are running in the top-four primary for United States Senate in Alaska on August 16, 2022. Incumbent **Sen. Lisa Murkowski (R)** is running for re-election. This is the first use of the top-four primary system for a U.S. Senate seat in Alaska since voters approved its use in November 2020. The four candidates to receive the most votes advance to the general election, where the winner is decided using ranked-choice voting. The 19 candidates include eight Republicans, three Democrats, one Libertarian, five independents, and two Alaskan Independence Party candidates.

The offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor are also up for election in 2022 and will also be determined by rank-choice voting. **Governor Mike Dunleavy (R)** is running for reelection.

## Wyoming

Neither Senator from Wyoming are up for reelection this year (2024 & 2026).

Wyoming has just one "at-large" representative in the U.S. House of Representatives, currently held by **Liz Cheney (R)**, who is up for reelection. She will face Republicans **Anthony Bouchard**, **Harriet Hageman**, **Robyn Belinskey**, and **Denton Knapp** in the August 16 primary.

A July Mason-Dixon poll sponsored by the Casper Star-Tribune showed Hageman, former President Trump's pick, <u>leading Cheney by 22 points</u>. Cheney has been dismembered from the Wyoming Republican Party after voting to impeach the former president after the incidents of Jan. 6 and constant criticism of Trump. Cheney currently is polling at a job approval rating of just 27 percent.

**Governor Mark Gordon (R)** will be running for reelection this year, facing Republican challengers in the August 16 primary.

### **UPCOMING RACES TO WATCH: AUGUST 23 PRIMARIES**

#### Florida

Well-known Senator and former Republican presidential candidate, **Marco Rubio (R)** is up for reelection this year. Rubio has been in office since 2011 and will face the winner of the Democratic primary. **Val Demings (D)** is the favored Democratic candidate.

In the race for governor, Representative **Charlie Crist (D)**, a former governor, faces Agriculture Commissioner **Nikki Fried (D)** to challenge incumbent Governor **Ron DeSantis (R)**.

## **Massachusetts**

Democrats, including Attorney General **Maura Healey (D)**, are looking to pick up the governor's seat in the liberal state after current Governor **Charlie Baker (R)** declined to run again.

#### **Delaware**

Both the Republican and Democrat primaries for Delaware's one House seat were canceled, putting forth incumbent **Lisa Blunt Rochester (D)** and **Lee Murphy (R)** to square off in November's general election.

No Senate races are on the ballot for 2022.

# **New Hampshire**

In New Hampshire, incumbent **Sen. Maggie Hassan (D)**, faces a crowded field hoping to replace her including State Senate president **Chuck Morse (R)**.

For battleground House Seat NH-01, incumbent **Chris Pappas (D)** will face the winner of a crowded Republican primary. Notable frontrunners include former Trump staffers **Matt Mowers (R)** and **Karoline Leavitt (R)**, as well as **Gail Huff Brown (R)**.

## Rhode Island
